Mandate Letter to the Catholic Education Commission of Western Australia (2009-2015)

For a school to be Catholic, it must first be a good school. Otherwise it will be unable to fulfil its mission. With many other education traditions, the Catholic school’s concept of education will be.

‘Catholic schools are important means through which the church proclaims the Gospel of Jesus Christ or evangelises, in the world of today. They are privileged places of evangelisation where the young learn the ‘Good News’ of salvation- and what it means to live as ‘new creatures in Christ through Baptism’ and knowingly as children of God.’

The Catholic school, however, differs in a fundamental way from those of other education traditions. What makes it distinctive is its vision of the 'fully integrated' human being.

'The Catholic school differs from all others which limit themselves to forming men and women. Its task is to form Christian men and women, and, by its witness and teaching, to show non-Christians something of the mystery of Christ, who surpasses all understanding.'

What is Evangelisation?

Evangelisation is everything we do that introduces, promotes, develops and gives witness to faith. It means bringing into fuller consciousness and into the practical life of the school what we are really on about. To evangelise is to be willing to share the good news about God with others. Evangelisation is about taking the risk to care for all people, inviting them to share in a Christian community in which they come to know God more fully, and in which they form a deeper relationship with God so God becomes central in their lives.

Evangelisation is an activity of faith, built upon the power of the message. It achieves its purpose gradually, for people need to accept the message for it to have its full effect. Evangelisation is any deliberate activity or action by which we cooperate with the self-revealing God. It involves sharing, risking and achieving.

Evangelisation:

'The challenge of the new evangelisation and catechesis depends on one fundamental point: "how to encounter Christ, what is the most consistent place to find Him and follow Him." "The question of how we are educating in the faith, therefore, is not rhetorical, but essential. The answer requires courage, creativity and decision to undertake sometimes still unexplored roads.'

Evangelisation is inclusive of Primary Proclamation (the process to assist others to arrive at an initial belief in Jesus and develop an initial interest in following Him) and Catechesis (processes for sharing the Christian experiences

of God and integrating these into the person's life experiences). Evangelisation is primarily about Christian Witness.

As educators and as a Church we need to acknowledge the, 'joys and the hopes, the griefs and the anxieties' (Gaudium Et Spes, 1) of the people we minister to. We need to acknowledge the current context or environment in which we live. These are the 'signs of the times,' and are needed to be continually worked with so that the Church and School Community embody the integration of faith, life and culture.

{Gaudium Et Spes (Ecclesiastical Latin: ['gawdium et 'spes], Joy and Hope), the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, was one of the four constitutions resulting from the Second Vatican Council. }

'For the Church, evangelisation means bringing the Good News into all strata of humanity, and, through its influence, transforming humanity from within and making it new....'


'The purpose of evangelisation is, therefore, precisely this interior change...the Church evangelises when she seeks to convert, solely through the divine power of the Message she proclaims, both the personal and the collective consciences of people, the activities in which they engage, and the lives and concrete milieux (*background or surroundings*) which are theirs.'

The General Catechetical Directory distinguishes two particular processes for evangelisation.

- 1) The first is the normal process of evangelisation which includes Christian witness and proclaiming the Word of God in ways that are appropriate to the different stages in people's journey in faith [GDC47].
- 2) The other is the 'New Evangelisation'. This is addressed to *baptised* people who have *lost* a sense of living *faith*, of *belonging* to the Church, and of *Christ* and the *Gospel* [GDC58(c) cf CCC154].
For these people [GDC90]:
The basis of their conversion is the Baptism which they have already received, and whose power they must develop.



Philosophy of Christ the King

Christ the King was established as the teaching arm of the Catholic Church in the Beaconsfield Parish. The school's philosophy of education has an explicit and all-pervasive religious dimension. At the heart of this religious dimension is the task of the transmission of truths, values, beliefs and attitudes of the Catholic Faith.

Christ the King was established in 1903 and the Sisters St Joseph of the Apparition who lived and worked in the Parish and the school until 1989. The school is a co-educational institution providing primary education from Kindergarten to Year 6. The school is an integral part of the Christ the King Parish and there is a very close relationship between the parish and the school.

The school's motto: 'Care for and Respect Everyone', is lived out in our vision of 'an inclusive community, growing together in faith by living our Catholic values and beliefs.' Through such a vision the school is able to foster a Christian mentality in our society, and to encourage young people to contribute more broadly to the development of the kind of world envisaged by Christ.

Aims of Christ the King

Christ the King aims to foster the total development of each child within a caring and safe community that is totally committed to supporting the Catholic principles and ideals.

We strive to:

- Being inclusive and focussed on the individual needs of every child.
- Supporting students to become meaningful and active members of society who model their Catholic faith.
- Working in partnership with families and parish to create a co-operative, enriching and affirming community.
- Offering a supportive, engaging and challenging learning environment.
- Providing opportunities for all students to reach their potential.
- Caring for and Respecting Everyone (CARE is our school motto and an integral part of our Pastoral Care program).
- Ensuring every child is challenged, engaged and striving for personal best.
- Explore the merits of various student resilience programs and the elements that fit with the school's CARE motto and implement as appropriate.
- Enhance student achievement and wellbeing.
- Increase student and staff engagement in their own learning and faith formation.
- Enhance parental engagement in their child's learning and faith formation
- Develop our people to be leaders in Catholic Education's Mission.
- Increase understanding of our personal and collective responsibility for Catholic Education's Mission
- Ensure inclusivity, good governance and the resource allocation required to meet our mission.
- Enhance opportunities for personal faith development.
- Increase enrolment of the vulnerable, poor and marginalised as a visible sign of our faith in action.

Definitions:

'Christian Witness' is always the 'first act of Evangelisation'. 'Witness' is how people strive to live as they respond to the God who dwells within them. It expresses the 'new life' a Christian receives through Baptism. Christian witness is being a Christ like presence to others. It gives them Christ like love, and models Christ-like example in the ways Christians live the First and Second Commandments of Jesus- loving God and others. This includes Christ like prayer and worship in the ways Christ taught.'

'Primary Proclamation' calls for people to accept initial personal relationships with Jesus Christ himself as Lord and Saviour. The primary proclamation of Jesus himself was the 'Kingdom of God', the divine power that he shares with all who believes in Him as Lord and Saviour. He revealed its power first through his miracles of healing, casting out demons, freeing cripples to walk and giving sight to the blind, hearing of the deaf and speech to the mute. Then he forgave sins and raised the dead.'

'Catechesis' is the central activity of evangelisation. Its first stage is called initiatory catechesis. Initiatory catechesis aims to help people mature from the initial conversation to Jesus Christ, which results from fruitful primary proclamation, to assist to develop deeper personal relationships. For the growth of Christian faith, primary proclamation must be followed by initiatory catechesis. Effective catechesis matures the faith stirred by primary proclamation to the depth required to live a Christian life. In the same way those seeking deeper personal relationship with Jesus today need to join in community with everyone else who is seeking the same, his church. It is within the community that they find the means Jesus left for anyone who wants a closer personal relationship with him to do so.'
