NUMERACY

- Comparing quantities (less and more)

 - Counting forwards to 20 and beyond, and backwards from ten

HASS

- The places people live in and belong to (neighbourhood, suburb, town, rural)
- The familiar features in the local area and why places are important to people
 - Sharing observations and ideas through oral retell, drawing and role-play
- The reasons some places are special to people and how we can look after them

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY

- Record design ideas through describing, drawing and modelling
 - Sequencing events
- Working independently or with others for solutions
- Using Seesaw tools, drawing, taking pictures, accessing activities and voiceover
 - Exploring new apps

BODY MANAGEMENT SKILLS

 Balance on either foot, upper body strength, agility activities and climbing on equipment

LOCOMOTOR SKILLS

· Running, jumping and hopping

OBJECT CONTROL SKILLS

• Throwing and catching a large playball and running with various equipment, putting on a League Tag belt and rolling up correctly

FUNDAMENTAL MOVEMENT SKILLS

- Simple relays (small, large and whole class), keeping within boundaries and responding to numbers in activities
- Cooperation with others when participating in physical activities – whole class and small groups

AUSLAN

During Term 2, students will continue to consolidate their Auslan skills from Term 1, with an emphasis on further developing nonverbal communication. Building upon the signs learned in Term 1, students will focus on learning new signs for various animals and family members, including those that represent different types of families. A special focus will be placed on signs for Mother's Day during Week 2, providing an opportunity for students to engage with the language in a meaningful, cultural context.

MUSIC

Students continue to develop performance skills (singing chants, songs, and rhymes, and playing classroom instruments in tune and in time)

Students continue to develop aural skills by exploring the elements of music including:

- rhythm (sound, silence; long, short; steady beat)
 - tempo (fast, slow)
 - pitch (high, low; pitch direction; distinguish between speaking and singing voice)
 - dynamics (loud, soft)
- form (same, different; echo patterns)
 - timbre (exploration of sounds produced on percussion instruments)

SCIENCE

Topic: Living Things

This term children will explore how plants and animals have basic needs that are met by the places they live.

Throughout the unit your child will:

- Explore their five senses and how these help us learn about the world around us
- Investigate what all living things need to survive such as food, water, air, and shelter
- Participate in hands on activities like sensory hunts, building shelters and creating models to show their understanding of living things and their needs

ART

In Visual Arts this term the children will:

- Work with various materials like coloured paper, magazines, buttons, and fabric scraps. They will cut, tear, and paste these materials to create collages
- children will collect leaves, flowers, and other natural objects and use these items to make rubbings, or arrange them into art pieces
- children will draw pictures or create art work based on stories they've read or heard helping them to connect art with their literacy development
- children will use simple printing techniques like stamping with fruits or vegetables, or making handprints
 - children will explore colours, (primary, secondary)
- children will learn about artists through hands-on art activities inspired by their techniques and styles
